

Roll into Reading

“Roll Into Reading” provides repeated personalized practice using a dice. On this template, we are practicing 2nd grade high-frequency words. Your child will roll a die and then read the words under the number rolled. For example, if I rolled the number three: I would read, large, only, study, also, follow. You might notice that some of the letters are red and some are black. On your template you will use just one color to write the practice words. I am using two colors to show you how to best fill yours out. When you fill in your template make sure you are including words that your child knows well (those would be the black ones on my template). Then you will include a few words your child can not read or spell yet (those would be the red ones). We want to include more words they know than they don't know to ensure the game is fun and does not cause frustration.

Fry's Phrases

Reading words in isolation too much can cause children to read like a woodpecker... pecking... at... words. Therefore, we also suggest reading words in short sentences and phrases. A true sign of reading proficiency is being able to read with expression. Here, we are playing “Roll-an-Emotion” using the same template with some added emojis. If I rolled a number 4, I would need to practice reading with a surprised expression so I would read the first two phrases like this: “A new bike! Look out!”

Fill in your blank template by Googling Fry's phrases for lists of phrases. According to Fry, these words make up approximately two-thirds of all the words students will encounter in their elementary school reading.



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Rodar a la lectura

“Rodar a la lectura” proporciona una práctica personalizada repetida usando un dado. En esta plantilla, estamos practicando palabras de alta frecuencia de 2o grado. Su hijo tirará un dado y luego leerá las palabras debajo del número. Por ejemplo, si rodara el número tres: leería, grande, sólo, estudiar, también, seguir. Usted puede notar que algunas de las letras son rojas y algunas son negras. En su plantilla utilizará un solo color para escribir las palabras de práctica. Estoy usando dos colores para mostrarte cómo llenar mejor el suyo. Cuando rellene su plantilla, asegúrese de que está incluyendo palabras que su hijo conoce bien (esas serían de negro en mi plantilla). Luego incluirá algunas palabras que su hijo no puede leer o deletrear muy bien (esas serían las rojas). Queremos incluir más palabras que conozcan de las que no saben para asegurarnos de que el juego sea divertido y no cause frustración.

Fry's Phrases

Leer demasiadas palabras de forma aislada puede hacer que los niños lean como un pájaro carpintero... Picoteando... en las ... Palabras. Por lo tanto, también sugerimos leer palabras en frases y frases cortas. Un verdadero signo de dominio de la lectura es ser capaz de leer con expresión. Aquí, estamos jugando "Roll-an-Emotion" "Rodar una Emoción" usando la misma plantilla con algunos emojis añadidos. Si rueda el dado en un número 4, tendría que practicar la lectura con una expresión sorprendida para leer las dos primeras frases como esta: "¡Una bicicleta nueva! ¡Cuidado!"

Rellene su plantilla en blanco buscando en Google las frases de Fry para obtener listas de frases. Según Fry, estas palabras representan aproximadamente dos tercios de todas las palabras que los estudiantes encontrarán en su lectura de la escuela primaria.



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
